#### Report of the Trustees for the year to 31 December 2003

1. The work of the Trust covering the calendar year of 2003 is set out in this Report to the Charity Commission and the community.

#### **Objects**

2. The Objects of the Trust are detailed on page 9, and statements by the Trustees on their policies on selection of individuals and institutions who are to receive grants, reserves, and investment are on pages 18 and 19.

#### **Trustees**

3. No new Trustees were appointed during the year. Mrs Jean Smith's term of office came to an end in November 2003. It was with great sadness that the Trustees heard of the death of John Daniels who had retired as a Trustee in January 2002.

#### Accounts

4. The annual accounts of the Trust are drawn up for the year to 31 December 2003. The surplus of income over expenditure for the period and the financial position of the Trust are set out in the accounts.

#### The Year 2003

- 5. For our area of benefit Charlwood, Hookwood and Lowfield Heath the year has been dominated by the Government consultation on the future of air transport. The consultation document published in February 2003 showed various options for one or two new runways at Gatwick. Any of the proposed options would have a serious, or even devastating, effect on the three communities. Public meetings in Charlwood and in Hookwood in March showed virtually unanimous opposition from local residents. The Trustees considered carefully how far they could help with any campaign, within the rules governing the use of charitable funds, but in the event no applications directly related to the campaign were received.
- 6. On December 16 the Government announced their decision in the White Paper "The Future of Air Transport". Whether or not Gatwick will get a new runway, after 2019, was left open depending on pollution levels at Heathrow. The wide spaced runway to the south of the airport was preferred, and land would be safeguarded for this and associated airport development. At the time of writing this report the official safeguarding map had not been published but the map in the White Paper showed that, in the area of benefit of this charity, all of Lowfield Heath and some land and houses at Charlwood would be included.

- 7. While our community felt relief that the immediate threat had been lifted, the Government announcement leaves the whole area of benefit suffering from uncertainty and blight. When the future is uncertain, the church and other charities find difficulty in raising funds for long term developments, householders hold back on repairs, and there is a danger that the villages will become run down and depressed.
- 8. The John Bristow and Thomas Mason Trust, which derived most of its funds from the sale of land indirectly as a result of airport expansion, is, however, available as a counterbalance to blight. By helping to keep the public buildings and public facilities in good repair, by helping to keep the churchyard tidy, by encouraging a sense of pride in village history and by supporting village clubs and societies, the Trust can help maintain a vigorous and lively community.

#### Hookwood play equipment

- 9. Charlwood Parish Council notified the Trust that the children's play equipment in both Hookwood and Charlwood was reaching the end of its useful life, and that new safety standards meant that the equipment in both play areas would need to be completely replaced. They indicated that they would tackle the Hookwood play area in 2003, and would then address the Charlwood play area in 2004.
- 10. The total cost of the new equipment for Hookwood was over £33,000. The Trust made a grant of £15,000 and offered a loan of up to £13,000 (repayable if the Council succeed in selling a plot of land which they own in Hookwood) but in the event the Council only needed to take up a loan of £7,826. The loan was not made until January 2004.
- 11. The Hookwood project, in the Withey recreation area adjacent to the new Memorial Hall, was completed in November. It included a mix of new play equipment in a dog free area for the infant and junior age groups, and swings and a robust goal post and netball hoop for the older children in the open grassed area. New safety surfacing, benches, picnic tables, litter bins and a new gate were installed.
- 12. The lease of the Withey, which is owned by this Trust, to Charlwood Parish Council was completed.

#### Dendrochronology report

- 13. Charlwood has long attracted the attention of archaeologists and was the first parish in England to have all its timber-framed houses scientifically recorded. In 2003 the Trust was approached by a local historian, Jean Shelley, with a request to fund a new research project by the Domestic Buildings Research Group (Surrey), and a grant of £3,000 was made.
- 14. Using the new technique of dendrochronology (tree-ring dating) 16 ancient buildings were accurately dated, with dates varying from 1401 to 1704. The research provided important information not only for the owners of the houses,

but for the whole community thus encouraging interest in village history and helping in the preservation of the houses. It was also of national importance by establishing more accurate dating criteria for old buildings, and by contributing to an emerging picture of national trends in building activity.

15. The Chairman of the Domestic Buildings Research Group (DBRG) sent the results of the survey to the Secretary of State for Transport as a contribution to the consultation on potential runway sites. In his covering letter he said: "The report confirms the pre-eminence of the village as a beautiful and treasured collection of old houses, of great value both aesthetically and scientifically. ... DBRG believes Charlwood to be a unique collection of ancient houses, arguably the finest in the County, with a coherence and standard of preservation which greatly enhances its scientific value."

#### Lowfield Heath church

- 16. St Michael and All Angels Church at Lowfield Heath requested a grant for emergency repairs to the nave. The renovation of the centre aisle and north pew platform was also due to be undertaken as the final part of a seven year plan of works which the Trust had agreed to finance.
- 17. The church is listed grade 2\* but was under threat of demolition if the plans for a new runway went ahead. The Trust therefore offered an interest free loan of up to £10,000 to cover all the proposed work. It was stated that the loan would only be repayable if the church building were sold within 25 years, otherwise it would become a grant. Acceptance of this condition has been confirmed by the relevant church authorities. In the event the work required was not as extensive as first thought necessary and the total cost was £4,484. The loan was not made until January 2004. Unfortunately further structural damage occurred due to the very dry summer and as from 4 January 2004 regular worship will no longer be held in the church although the occasional service will take place.

#### **Education**

- 18. Under the rules governing the Trust, the net income of Bristow's Cottage and Charity Field must be spent on education. During 2003 the net income, after expenses and repayment of capital, amounted to £1,516. A variety of educational projects were financed.
- 19. A grant of £7,359 was given to Charlwood Village Infant School to cover the cost of three new Interactive Whiteboards, one for each classroom, to enable children and staff to access ICT (Information Computer Technology) more easily across the whole curriculum. A computer in each classroom projects information onto a whiteboard for the whole class to see; the whiteboard is interactive as it enables both teaching staff and children to write directly onto the board using special pens or to input information via the computer.

20. A grant of £2,880 was made to the Charlwood School PTA towards the cost of providing swimming lessons.

£2,500 was given towards Venture Week 2003.

And a grant was given to provide first aid training for the staff of the Hookwood Play Group.

In 1999 to help Woody's After School Club to start up, a loan of £1,000 had been made as well as an initial grant of £500. In 2003 the loan of £1,000 was converted into an outright grant.

#### Charlwood church and churchyard

- 21. Repairs to the 15th century windows in St. Nicholas' church (listed grade 1) were completed in 2002. The Trust had provided a grant of £16,000 with an offer to increase this depending on the final cost of the work. The total cost amounted to £24,523 and the Trust provided an additional grant of £5,000.
- 22. A grant of £2,240 was agreed towards the cost of churchyard maintenance. Due to the dry summer the actual grant required was only £1,527 which was requested in February 2004. The stone paved footpath (also listed) through the churchyard is much used by the public, and the view of the churchyard appeared several times on national television as the backdrop to interviews about the new runway proposals.

#### The Lowfield Heath windmill

23. The windmill was repainted in May with the aid of a grant, made by the Trust last year, of £5,869. The final cost was, however, higher than originally estimated because when close inspection of the woodwork became possible it was found that an additional undercoat was required. A further grant of £1,175 was made.

#### Village societies

24. Grants were made to the Charlwood Women's Institute, and to the Charlwood Royal British Legion Women's Section, towards the cost of hiring the Parish Hall for their meetings. A grant was made to the Charlwood Players towards the cost of their pantomime "Babes in the Wood'.

#### Care of those in need

25. A grant of £3,000 was made to St Catherine's Hospice to help towards the employment of a specialist community nurse. £150 was given towards the cost of the Horley Play Scheme for children with learning disabilities. A number of grants, totalling £857, were given to persons in need, for example for the service and rent of community alarms which help to enable the elderly to remain in their own homes.

#### Charity Field, Beggarhouse Lane, Charlwood

26. Last year we reported that the new owner of Beggars Gill Wood was claiming ownership of Charity Field, which has been held by the John Bristow Charity since 1637, and that the Trustees had put the matter in the hands of our solicitors. Charity Field did not appear in the sale particulars of the Wood so it was obvious that the claim was unfounded. The confusion was eventually sorted out at no cost to the Trust when the Land Registry admitted that they had made a mistake.

#### Property and insurance

- 27. Over the years the Trust has acquired various land and property holdings in the parish, namely
  - Bristow's Cottage, let on an assured shorthold tenancy;
  - Charity Field, now let on a farm business tenancy;
  - the Millennium Field, leased to Charlwood Parish Council at a peppercorn rent;
  - the Tifters drive, over which there are rights of way;
  - the Withey, leased to Charlwood Parish Council at a peppercorn rent;
  - the site of the Hookwood Memorial Hall, leased to the Hookwood Memorial Hall Trust at a peppercorn rent; and
  - the drive leading to the Hookwood Memorial Hall over which there are rights of way.

During 2003 the insurance arrangements relating to all these holdings were reviewed and tidied up so as to ensure that the Trust has adequate cover.

#### **Finance**

28. The funds of the Trust continue to be invested in Common Investment Funds approved by the Charity Commission. In repayment of capital used for the renovation of Bristow's Cottage, £5,200 was transferred from income account to capital. In October it was decided to invest £20,015 held on deposit in the capital account in Cazenove Equity Income Trust for Charities.

The total capital held by the Trust at the end of the year in shares and cash was £1,486,324 compared to £1,366,530 at the end of 2002. If the capital value of Bristow's Cottage and Charity Field are included, the capital assets of the Trust amounted to £1,781,324.



#### **Auditors' Report**

# Independent Auditors' Report to the Trustees of the John Bristow and Thomas Mason Trust

We have audited the financial statements on pages 12 to 17 of the above named Trust for the year ended 31 December 2003. These have been prepared under the historical cost conventions and the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the Trustees, as a body. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Trustees those matters that we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by the law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to any one other than the Trust and the Trustees as a body, for our audit work, or the opinions we have formed.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described on page 8, the Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements. It is our responsibility to form an independent opinion, based on our audit, on those statements and to report our opinion to you. We have been appointed Auditors under section 43 of the Charities Act 1993 and report in accordance with regulations made under section 44 of that Act.

#### Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the Trustees in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatements, whether caused by fraud or error. In forming our opinion, we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

#### Notes to the Accounts 31 December 2003

#### 1. Accounting Policies

The Accounts include dividends, interest receivable and interest payable up to 31 December 2003.

Provision is made for grants and loans which have been formally approved by the Trustees and notified to applicants before 31 December 2003. Investments are stated at middle price. Both the recreation land at The Withey, Hookwood and the Millennium Field, Charlwood are carried at £1 each because these are non income producing assets. Bristow's Cottage and Charity Field are shown at the open market values as at 31 December 2001.

#### 2. Taxation

As a registered charity, the Trust is not subject to United Kingdom corporation tax or income tax. Any tax deducted from interest is recoverable.

The Trust is not registered for Value Added Tax. VAT suffered on expenditure therefore is irrecoverable and written off except in cases where Charlwood Parish Council is involved.

#### 3. Expenditure on Property

#### 4. Pension contributions

The Trustees made pension contributions of £506.49 during the year on behalf of their employee.

#### 5. Bristow's Cottage and Charity Field

White & Sons, Estate Agents and Surveyors of Dorking, Surrey, carried out the following property valuations as at 31 December 2001. The basis of the valuation was the open market value for owner occupation as defined in the R.I.C.S. Appraisal and Valuation Manual (The Red Book). White & Sons are not an Independent Valuer strictly as defined in the Appraisal and Valuation Manual as they receive remuneration in respect of the management of both of the above properties. Nevertheless the Trustees accept White & Sons valuation advice as an Independent Valuer notwithstanding their continuing professional involvement with the Trustees in respect of both properties valued.

#### 6. Investments

Investments in Common Investment Funds stated at middle prices totalling £1,484,324 have an original cost of £1,463,165 as shown on page 17.

#### 7. Renovations to Bristow's Cottage

The Charity Commission gave permission for the Trustees to spend up to £130,000 from permanent endowment for the purposes of renovating Bristow's Cottage, subject to replacement from income, repayable over 25 years. The second repayment of £5,200 was made in 2003 leaving a balance of £119,600.

#### 8. Commitments - Interest free loans

During the year the Trustees agreed to make interest free loans:

- to Charlwood Parish Council, for a term of one year, to be reviewed at the end of the year, to enable them to go ahead with the project to replace the play equipment at The Withey, Hookwood
- to St. Michael & All Angels Church, Lowfield Heath for emergency repairs, the loan to be repayable only if a capital sum, or sums, is made within 25 years of the making of the loan on a sale or lease of St. Michael & All Angels Church and in so far as any part of the loan, or the whole loan, is still outstanding at the end of that period any such sums received will be applied as first priority.

#### **Statements of Policies**

#### Policy on selection of individuals and institutions who are to receive grants

The Trustees have made the following statement:

- i) the area of benefit will be taken as a whole and applications from any part of the area of benefit or communities within them will be considered on merit;
- steps will be taken to achieve growth both in capital and in income but in particular to preserve Bristow's Cottage and other capital of the Trust for future generations;
- iii) in supporting projects and societies, the Trustees are determined that voluntary fund-raising efforts must not be impaired and it wishes community involvement to remain as strong as it has been in past years;
- iv) the Trust will work in co-operation with other charities within the area of benefit such as Smiths and Earle's.

#### Reserves Policy.

In line with the guidance issued by the Charity Commission, the Trustees have reviewed the need for reserves. The Trustees seek to apply all income on charitable purposes as soon as is reasonably prudent, however they have concluded:

- 1. that it is right to keep between about £20,000 to £30,000 in reserve as this approximates to four months outgoings and this is the amount required to ensure that the Trust can be run efficiently and to meet grant applications without delay.
- 2. that it is right to keep additional reserves when it is anticipated that there is a real prospect that the Trustees will, within the following two years or thereabouts, make a grant which is greater than 20% of the budgeted annual income. The amount of this reserve will depend on the size of the anticipated grant or the accumulated total if there is more than one.

The Trustees monitor the level of reserves at least three times a year.

#### **Investment Policy**

The Trustees have made the following statement:

It is the Trustees' policy to invest in equities and in fixed interest stock and to place money with deposit takers.

The objective is to achieve growth, both in capital and income, but in particular to preserve the capital for future generations. Within that broad objective the aim is to obtain income of £60,000 upwards per annum from these investments.

The Trustees have appointed Cazenove as investment advisors. They seek low risk investments and place no restrictions. Some funds are placed on deposit with Cazenove otherwise investments are in Common Investment Funds and Common Deposit Funds approved by the Charity Commission. The performance benchmarks are the FTSE All Share index for equity funds and the FTSE Government All Stocks index for fixed interest funds. Cazenove have no discretion to change the equity or fixed interest investments without specific instructions from the Trustees. Two or three Common Investment Funds from different Investment House are chosen for both equity and fixed interest investments.

The ratio between funds in equities, fixed interest and on deposit will vary, but in general 50% to 70% will be in equities and 30% to 50% in fixed interest. A small proportion may be with a deposit taker or in a current bank account.

Cazenove report four times a year on the investment performance and the investment policy is reviewed at least once a year.

The Trust also owns real property and there are special reasons for each holding. The Trustees do not invest in real property for purely investment purposes.

# HISTORY OF THE JOHN BRISTOW AND THOMAS MASON TRUST

The John Bristow and Thomas Mason Trust formally came into existence on 1 March 1999 when the two Charlwood Charities of the John Bristow Trust and the Thomas Alexander Mason Trust combined to form a single new charity to carry out the work of both the charities.

#### History of John Bristow's Charity

John Bristow was rector of Charlwood from 1615 until his death in 1637. He was a local Charlwood man whose family had lived here for at least two centuries. He was comparatively well off, owning properties in Horley and Charlwood.

During his lifetime John Bristow built a cottage now known as Bristow's Cottage and gave it, and the half acre adjoining, under the care of six trustees, to be "a Schoolhouse, and for the teaching of two poor children therein gratis". In his will he added a field of seven acres, now called Charity Field, beside Beggarshouse Lane, and increased to three the number of children to receive free education.

The cottage remained as the village school for over 200 years, until a new and larger boys' school was built in 1840 and a new girl's school (now the Parish Hall) in 1852. In 1863 it was recorded that the aged schoolmaster, John Mann, was still teaching without charge, four poor children to read, write and cast accounts. Subsequently the cottage was let, with the rental income being used to support education.

For many years the cottage was occupied by a well known Charlwood character, Eric Wickens, and his family. When he died in 1995 the trustees decided that the cottage needed extensive restoration, to preserve it and to bring the bathroom and kitchen up to date. The charity did not, however, have sufficient funds to finance this expenditure, and therefore suggested an amalgamation with the Thomas Alexander Mason Trust. The Charity Commission decided that the merger made sense since the Bristow's Charity and the Thomas Alexander Mason Trust both covered the same area of benefit, both covered education, both had the Rector of Charlwood as an ex officio trustee, and since the merger would allow the new charity to spend some of its capital on the restoration. The merger also allows the cottage to be retained in community ownership, thus preserving a unique part of the heritage of the village.

#### **History of the Thomas Alexander Mason Trust**

Thomas Alexander Mason was born in Southwark in 1859. Actually he was born as Thomas Alexander Bear but changed his name to Mason by deed poll when he was 29. He inherited a successful family tobacco business which he sold to British American Tobacco at the end of the first world war. For many years he lived in Reigate, and died at the age of 90. He was a solitary man and a private benefactor, often buying plots of land and giving them to charities.

In 1926 he bought an acre of land in the centre of the village of Lowfield Heath "for the purpose of a recreation ground and open space". There is no record of why he made this gift. At that time Lowfield Heath was part of the Parish of Charlwood and the Charlwood Parish Council became the trustee for the land.

In the 1970's much of the village of Lowfield Heath was demolished due to the noise from Gatwick Airport, leaving just the church and the windmill. The 1973 boundary changes transferred Lowfield Heath to Crawley, but the Charity Commission ruled that the land should remain under the trusteeship of the Charlwood Parish Council.

During the following eight years the ground became disused and overgrown and eventually planning permission was obtained for development.

In November 1981 the land was sold for £490,000. After guidance and direction from the Charity Commission as to who should have responsibility for safeguarding this large sum for the Parish, a new charitable trust was set up named after the original donor. The Trust, which came into existence in January 1983, was "for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Parish of Charlwood", with the boundaries as they were in 1926 when Thomas Mason made his gift (as illustrated on page 10).

Between 1983 and 1999, before the amalgamation with Bristow's Charity, the Thomas Alexander Mason Trust made 315 grants totalling over £850,000. Some of the larger grants:

- \* enabled St. Nicholas Church (Grade 1) to be repaired and restored. The Norman church is a Grade 1 listed building, dating from around 1080 which was given grants to cover repairs to the stonework, tower, roof and the walls, a new heating system and redecoration. The Trust also enabled the purchase of a printing machine and made grants towards the cost of churchyard maintenance.

  Total grants £210,821
- \* provided **The Withey** as a recreation area for Hookwood. This piece of land in the centre of Hookwood was acquired in 1987 and landscaped by the Trust. It is now managed by the Parish Council. **Total grants £107,708**
- \* enabled the Woodland Trust to purchase and open for public enjoyment over 120 acres of woodland. Grants made from 1983 to 1992 helped them buy land in Glovers Wood. Grants in 1987 and 1989 enabled them to by Edolph's Copse and Ricketts Wood. A grant in 1986 enabled the removal of an ugly barn in Edolph's Copse.

  Total grants £70,490
- \* made to Charlwood Parish Council, mainly for the modernisation of The Pavilion. Other grants were made for new play equipment and safety surfaces on Charlwood Recreation Ground, for the provision of footways, village notice boards, and towards the cost of the village sign.

  Total grants £66,289
- \* helped Charlwood Parish Hall with external repairs, damp proofing, new flooring, redecoration, heating, new stage curtains and rails, provision of disabled toilet and disabled ramp, repairs to the Cottage

  Total grants £59,202
- \* helped with the rescue, restoration and rebuilding of Lowfield Heath Windmill on a new site in Charlwood.

  Total grants £49,831
- \* made to Charlwood Village School towards swimming expenses, a part-time voluntary teacher, computers, photocopier, typewriter, sinks and running water in all classrooms, patio doors, creative play area and many other items of equipment. Total grants £44,132
- \* provided funds for extensive repairs to the church of St. Michael and All Angels at Lowfield Heath. Work undertaken included repairs to the tower and fabric, replacing the rose window, renovating the organ, provision of a new boiler and internal redecoration.

  Total grants £39,143
- \* purchased 2 acres of land for public recreation next to Charlwood Recreation Ground (Millennium Field)

  Total grants by 1999 £38,679
